

A Warm Welcome from the Chair

I hope you will be as excited as I am by the brilliant music treats Bach, Haydn, Schubert, Schumann, Brahms, in store. Tchaikovsky, Ravel... alongside the lesser known but brilliant Skalkottas, Montsalvatge and Stevens, and four thrilling (but not too scary!) living composers: Caroline Shaw, Sadie Harrison, Erkki-Sven Tüür and, Scotland's own, James MacMillan. An intriguing, stimulating range, as I hope you will agree. We begin with piano quintets by Shostakovich and Dvořák, then hear the amazing Phoenix Duo, who played at Paxton last year, and I knew I must entice to Melrose. Another highlight promises to be star trumpeter Aaron Akugbo offering an exhilarating programme, including three pieces by Florence Price and an arrangement of My Funny Valentine. Either side of Christmas, we showcase two leading performers from Europe: the dynamic Portuguese soprano Filipa Portela, and Max Mostovetski, one of the most promising young pianists in Germany. With the approach of spring, we will hear Mozart's quartet and Beethoven's sonata, and hope that Gershwin's Summertime does not seem too premature. Our season will end with a sublime trio composed by an Austrian, Franz Schubert, played by a Greek pianist, an American cellist and a Malayan violinist. Isn't it wonderful how music can bring the world together? Please, come and be part of this celebration of musicality and humanity.

Following her wonderful performance earlier this year in a piano duo with Julian Perkins, we are absolutely delighted to welcome back Emma to play two great piano quintets with one of the finest string quartets in Britain, the Sacconi, who will begin our season with Caroline Shaw's intriguing *Entr'acte*. Shaw describes her 2011 composition, inspired by the minuet of Haydn's *Op. 77 No. 2*, as "structured like a minuet and trio, riffing on that classical form but taking it a little further." I can think of no more fitting way to start our season, which as a whole combines established classics with explorations in newer and less familiar musical territories.

Following her sensational performance of Poulenc's *La Voix Humaine* at the Edinburgh Festival in 2019, the Portuguese soprano Filipa Portela has been in great demand in opera houses and recital halls across Europe. Accompanied by Scottish pianist, Gregor Forbes, who will also play some of Debussy's evocative piano miniatures, her "outstanding and effortless virtuosity" (*Leipzig Glocal*) will, on a cold winter's night in Melrose, conjure up the heat, light and passions of the Mediterranean.

Sunday 18th Feb 3pm Max Mostovetski "From Leipzig to Scotland"

Born in 2001 in Leipzig, Max is one of the most promising young pianists in Germany. He will be visiting Melrose as he retraces the steps of Mendelssohn across Scotland. As well as the "Scottish" sonata, Max will be playing compositions associated with his native city: by Bach, of course, and Schumann, but also three gentlemen who shared a Christmas dinner in 1887 at the Leipzig home of violinist Adolph Brodsky: Brahms, Tchaikovsky and Greig.

The Hungarian violinist and English pianist invite us to welcome spring with some exhilarating vernal virtuosity. Kreisler's Syncopation sets the mood for the "jazzy, teasing syncopations" (Chicago Tribune) of Erkki-Sven Tüür's Conversio, which since its composition in 1994 has established itself as one of the most engaging recent works for violin and piano. Sadie Harrison's Aurea Luce (2015) is based on a plainsong chant - "the beauteous light of Eternity hath flooded with blissful fires this golden day" sung in St Peter's, Rome each February 22nd, as spring is about to begin. The sense of returning light infuses Grieg's second sonata, which moves from melancholy to a joyous spring dance. The most famous musical celebration of spring, Beethoven's Op. 24, prepares for Gershwin's languorous Summertime.
