Hamish Strathdee, guitar

From Brisbane, Hamish Strathdee is the foremost classical guitarist in Australia, his CDs receiving rave reviews across the world. We are proud to host the Scottish debut of this major artist, who will play a delightful mix of memorable melodies: mournful Elizabethan lute music, exuberant virtuoso variations on themes by Rossini; unforgettable lyricism from the Paraguayan genius whom John Williams regards as “the greatest guitarist/composer of any time”; and, finally, new works from prominent young Australian composers, and when I say new, two were completed only last year.

Sunday, April 26th 3pm - Marianna Abrahamyan and Ethan Chan, piano solo and four hands



16-year-old Ethan Chan won the prestigious European Union of Music Competitions for Youth prize last year. Alongside his distinguished teacher at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland, Marianna Abrahamyan, the duo will juxtapose Kurtág's homages and extrapolations with the classics that inspired them, and feature works by his close friend and other great György of Hungarian music, Ligeti: a dazzling array of baroque, classical, romantic, modern and postmodern masterpieces to mark the 100th birthday of a brilliant composer and the emergence of an exciting young talent.

Concert Royal, one of Britain's first "authentic instrument" ensembles, has, remarkably, retained the same personnel for fifty years. This concert on their farewell tour, is absolutely your last chance to hear them recreate the sophisticated charm of a C18th musical entertainment in which German baroque sonatas and fantasies are played alongside British folk-song arrangements, dances and character pieces.

Sunday, June 28th 3pm – The Bute Wind Quintet

Our celebration of Kurtág's 100th birthday concludes with one of his earliest works, alongside music by composers with intimidating reputations. Fear not: Ligeti here is at his liveliest, quirkiest and wittiest; Berio's amusing "entertainment for children" is a set of animal impressions; Stockhausen's elegy is sublimely poignant. All these contrasting moods mingle in the greatest wind quintet ever composed: if you like the lush mysticism of *Verklärte Nacht*, you will be utterly entranced by Schoenberg's Op.26. György Ligeti: *Six Bagatelles*; György Kurtág: *Wind Quintet, op.2*; Luciano Berio: *Opus Number Zoo*; Karlheinz Stockhausen: *Adieu*; Arnold Schoenberg: *Wind Quintet, Op. 26*



Sunday, July 19th 3pm – Simon Callaghan, Piano



One of the leading pianists of his generation, Simon Callaghan has recorded more than fifty CDs and performed in many of the major concert halls around the world. In Melrose, he will play two extraordinary pieces from 1908 by young English composers, both of which he has recorded to great critical acclaim. Rebecca Clarke's *Theme and Variations*, with its Schubertian grace and charm, established her as an emerging feminine talent in those chauvinistic times. Cyril Scott's astonishingly original first sonata so impressed Stravinsky that he incorporated its rhythmic motifs into *The Rite of Spring*. Simon's recital ends with arguably the most profound sonata ever, Schubert's last, completed just weeks before his death.

Sunday, August 16th 3pm – “Some of my Favourite Songs”

Maria Waszyrowska, soprano & Harris Playfair, piano



We are delighted to welcome back this locally-based duo for an intriguingly eclectic recital, mingling melodious art songs with popular show tunes and jazz interpretations. Maria made her amazing debut for us two years ago as a mezzo, but has since gone up in the musical world in more ways than one. She will again sing songs from her native Poland, this time by Chopin and Szymanowski, and include two of Tchaikovsky's much-loved opus 38 set. We also begin our celebration of Bruno Walter on 150th anniversary of his birth with six of his charming, but rarely-heard, *lieder*, which channel his love of Schumann, Brahms and - of course - his close friend and mentor, Mahler. Walter fled Vienna in 1938 as the Nazis took control, as did Georg von Trapp, whose story was adapted into *The Sound of Music*, with *Edelweiss* paying tribute to Austrian folk music. Indeed, Richard Rodgers's must have a claim to have deposed Johann Strauss as the waltz king, for surely *Blue Moon* is better known now than the *Blue Danube*, and then there are *My Favourite Things*, *Falling in Love with Love*, *Wonderful Guy* ...

Sunday, Sept. 6th, 3pm - Boglárka György, violin & Amy Butler, piano



The scintillating duo that performed Beethoven's "Spring" Sonata so memorably for us in 2024 return to play his passionate "Kreutzer" Sonata. Our celebration of Bruno Walter continues with his only sonata, inspired by and modelled on the Beethoven, and with works from the two composers Walter most admired. He made the first commercial recording of Mahler's *Symphony No.5* with the NYPO in 1947. Its poignant *Adagietto*, made famous by Visconti's film *Death in Venice*, sounds wonderful as a delicate duet in this sensitive arrangement. Mozart's *K301* is his first masterpiece in the genre, with a gorgeous lilting waltz as a *finale*.

Sunday, Sept. 27th, 3pm: Duo Biz'art, piano four-hands



Our celebration of Bruno Walter reaches an appropriately epic, spectacular, climax with his astonishing transcription of Mahler's *Symphony No 1, "The Titan"*, played by the Belgian duo of André Roe and Geoffrey Baptiste, who have, over the last two decades, become one of the top piano duos in Europe. Leonard Bernstein began his career as Walter's assistant at the NYPO, making his sensational debut at Carnegie Hall in 1943 when the Austrian refugee was ill with 'flu, so it is appropriate that we will hear his *West Side Story Suite*. His fellow American, and friend, John Corigliano's *Gazebo Dances* are exuberant, exhilarating foot-tappers. Scotland's John Hearn's *Strange and Solemn Music* is as moody and evocative as its Shakespearean title suggests.

Sunday, Oct. 25th, 3pm: Nikodem Rodzeń, violin



This charismatic young virtuoso from Warsaw performs an irresistible programme of undoubted masterpieces, exploring the full range of emotions. Bach's second *partita*, culminating the famous plaintive and searingly beautiful *ciaccona* contrasts remarkably with his sunny, lilting *Preludio* and *Loure* in E Major. Grażyna Bacewicz, renowned during her lifetime as an exceptionally talented violinist, is now recognised as one of the finest, most engaging, composers of the last century, her works for her own instrument being particularly uplifting. A performance of Berio's intense, passionate, technically demanding (a euphemism for "almost impossible") *Sequenza VIII* is an unforgettably exhilarating experience, with gorgeous moments of serenity amid the mayhem.

One of the world's best guitarists will brighten and warm a November afternoon with captivating works associated with Picasso. Goss' piece depicts a medieval pilgrimage to Coruna, where the painter spent his childhood. Llobet was a drinking companion of the artist in Barcelona; Pujol befriended him in Paris. His *Old Guitarist*, which inspired Tippett's great composition, might just be playing a tune by Sor or Regondi.

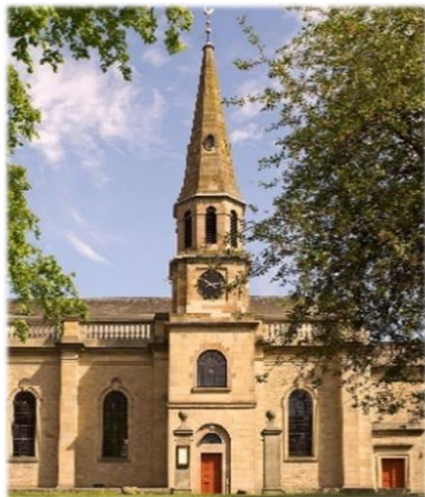
